Salem and the Civil War

- 2.4
  - o Abraham Lincoln can be discussed in our exhibit on the Civil War
- 2.5
  - Memorial Day began after the Civil War to honor soldiers who had died in combat, so this exhibit can discuss that origin
- VS. 7
  - We can discuss the Civil War through lens of local involvement and battles
- USI.8 & 9, VUS.6 & 7
  - This exhibit covers the build up to the Civil War and local involvement in the War

Small Town to Biggs City: The Hometown Art of Walter Biggs

- 1.2
  - Life in VA today can be discussed through this artist who lived until the 1960s
- VS. 6, USI.8
  - We can discuss migration and life in the first half of the 1800s by describing this space when it was a store along The Great Road (and we can explain history of The Wilderness Road vs Great Road)

  - We can discuss how Salem grew as a town and region thanks to the Roanoke River, the Great Road, and other geographical features

Native Americans and Tutelo Town; European Settlers

- K.11, 2.5
  - o Thanksgiving can be related to local Native American tribes

- 1.3, 2.3
  - We can relate the other tribes students are learning about to local Native American tribes
- 2.7
  - The relationship between the environment and culture of local Native American tribes can be explored
- VS.2, USI.3
  - Local Native American tribes are in the Blue Ridge Mountains and are found along the Roanoke River
  - Students can learn more about how the river and local environment shaped Native American culture
- USI.4, WHII.4, VUS.2
  - Salem was an area with one of the first interactions between SWVA
    Native Americans and European explorers

Colonial Heroes – William Fleming and Andrew Lewis

- K.11, 1.4, 2.5
  - George Washington Day (Presidents Day) and Independence Day can be explored since Andrew Lewis was good friends with George Washington, and William Fleming served as a military surgeon under both of them during the French and Indian War
- 1.2, VUS.5
  - George Washington can be discussed through his friendship with Andrew Lewis and his working with William Fleming
- VS.5, USI.6, VUS.4
  - The Revolutionary War can be discussed through the experiences of William Fleming and Andrew Lewis
- VUS.4
  - Andrew Lewis and William Fleming both fought in the French and Indian War so it can be discussed through their lens

  - Life in Virginia today can be explored through the popular culture built around sports and attending sporting events
- 3.3
  - We can discuss the evolution of ancient sports to modern while noting that the draw for spectators has remained the same
- USIL9
  - This exhibit can be used to discuss the evolution of sports as entertainment in the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Centuries
- VUS.13-14
  - Exploring the segregation and integration of Salem schools and the role of sports as an entertainment in American life

Lakeside: Sixty Summers of Ups and Downs

  - Life in VA today can be explored through the amusement park that was in Salem until the 1980s
- VS. 9
  - o Lakeside covers cultural history and interests from 1920 to 1986
- USII.6 & 9
  - Lakeside covers cultural history, and its rise and fall can be related to the advent of electrification and the evolution of entertainment in US culture
- VUS.13 & 14
  - How Lakeside developed and became popular relates directly to technology changes and their impacts on American life

#### A Brown House Parlor

- VS.6 & 8, USI.8, WHII.8 & 9, VUS.8
  - o This Victorian parlor can be used to discuss daily life in the 1800s
  - We can discuss the evolution of society with development of inventions/ Industrialization

- WG.16 & 17, WHII.8 & 9
  - We can discuss the impact of urban development and globalization on Salem throughout time

## Curiosities from Salem's Attics

- 1.2
  - Life in VA today can be discussed by comparing modern items to the historical items found in the attic (ex. Typewriter vs a laptop)
- 2.5
  - Memorial Day and Veterans Day can be discussed from the artifacts from the World Wars found in this exhibit (Veterans Day began on the anniversary of the end of WWI)
- VS.8 & 9, USII. 3-7
  - Various artifacts in the attic can be related to Reconstruction through today
- USL8 & 9
  - Various artifacts in the attic include items from the mid-1800s through Reconstruction
- WHII.8-12, VUS.8-11
  - These items reflect a changing nation, changing industries, and evolution of daily life

#### Fashion Dolls

  - Cultural history from the early 1800s to early 1900s can be covered by looking at the evolution of fashion at this time
